Lapley, Stretton and Wheaton Aston Parish Council	LSWA PC identifies a need for more housing association houses rather than private rentals as it is in increasing the prices and making homes unaffordable. The prices of new homes within the parish are still high for the district and is excluding younger families to buy in the parish and stay near family.	The Council recognises the issues around affordability across the district, including in this parish. The draft strategy confirms the need for more affordable housing (Priority 1), in response to rising house prices. Rural exception sites are an excellent tool for providing affordable housing for local people, particularly to allow young families to remain in the parish they grew up in and

stay near to family. The Council will be happy to support the Parish Council in exploring this further, initially through a Parish Need Survey to assess local affordable housing need. Subsequently, if the Parish Council wish to, they can then consider site options to deliver affordable homes on a rural exception site, which are then reserved solely for those with a local connection to the parish.
